Health Promoting Schools



Chris gave us a talk and a power point display about the history of the sanctuary and the work that takes place there. She showed us some pictures of animals that had been abused and neglected by their owners. Pictures of horrific injuries to horses and dogs who had been rescued by the volunteers and after medical care, some love and attention had been successfully re homed to grateful owners.

We learned that L.A.W. depends on the goodness of people for funding, through their shops, flag days and donations and receive a small grant from the Dept of Agriculture each year but while this is welcomed it comes nowhere near the cost of running the facility, the fees for the vets alone costing over 40,000 a month.

After the talk Sam answered all our questions then we got a walking tour of the grounds where we got to see all the rescued animals, horses, dogs, cats, rabbits, sheep, donkeys, goats, she told us they even had a seal at one stage which is now gone back

The Sanctuary functions 24/7 365 day a year even on Christmas Day

So if you feel like taking a trip out to see them and maybe even walk a dog during your Christmas break they would love to see you

Enable Ireland provides services to children and adults with disabilities and their families from 40 locations in 14 counties. Covering childhood to adulthood our expert teams work with the individual and their family on a plan for each life stage.

On the 24th of October we collected phones from 1st and 2nd years in the school at 12 noon. We then sealed them in an envelope with each individuals name and class on it and placed them in the school safe until the next day. The next day we gave the eager students their phones back and they gave us their sponsor ship money we managed to raise €730, Thank you to all the 1st and 2nd years and to everyone that donated

The next day we went around asking questions to a few students that participated in the No Phone Survival Challenge;

- 1. Would you do it again ? All said yes at it is for a good cause.
- 2. How long do you usually spend on you phone per day? Half an hour, the other two said all day
- 3. Was there any temptations? All said yes, looking up stuff for homework and organising lifts were hard.
- 4. How did you occupy yourself? Went to bed, TV and completed fundraising.
- 5. Do you think you rely on your phone too much? Yes-cant communicate without it, "if it goes out of battery, I go out of battery."

Chris Kelly Returns to CCC



Chris Kelly - Best Young Entrepreneur



The co-founder and CEO of Pinpoint Innovations, and former student, Chris Kelly was invited back to Crescent on Tuesday 28th November to give a presentation about his entrepreneurial success to Nuala McGann's fifth year business class. Having left Crescent not long ago Chris Kelly got his start in business through a former boss inviting him to join a project outside their normal work. The project failed not long after, but Mr Kelly was unfazed and his spark for entrepreneurialism was lit. He started two more unsuccessful businesses with friends he met through events like the "Hackathon", where coder from across Ireland come together to do 24 to 48 hours straight of coding. Figuring third time lucky Chris Kelly and fellow business partners, Eoin O'Brien and Fionn Barron, created the company Pinpoint Innovations. The product that they produced is called xsonor[™], which is going under trials currently in the University Hospital Limerick.

Xsonor[™], to quote from their website is " a patient tracking system that creates a holistic patient journey, driving hospital efficiencies that results in an exceptional perioperative experience." In layman's terms, it tracks patients and equipment as it travels through the hospital, quickly and easily in order to save time. Chris Kelly has been working on this project since August of 2016, but has no intention of stopping with UHL. During the question and answers segment of his presentation to the 5th year business students he explained his plans to continue growing the business, and to start more after Pinpoint stabilises.

Before the class Ms McGann asked how many would consider opening a business. About 3 hands of 24 were raised, but after Mr Kelly's speech the number surged to about 15. Clearly an inspirational speaker, we owe a huge thank you to Chris Kelly for coming back to the Crescent to speak to us, and to his brother Gary for giving him the invitation. Good luck on getting that yacht Chris!
