Kate Russell Champions 2019



On Monday 18th the senior hockey team had their final training session of the season. All of us were excited for the three days ahead of us. We were feeling nervous but were inspired after the past captain of the Kate Russell hockey team for 2015, Michelle Barrett showed us her gold medal.

That Wednesday we left the school on the team bus at eleven o'clock. We were all buzzing with the excitement. We were overjoyed with the opportunity we finally earned ourselves, to take part in the Kate Russell final. Once we reached Dublin the exhilaration was overwhelming. We checked in to the Talbot Hotel and headed for training on the St. Andrews water based pitch in preparation for the next two days. After training we settled back into the hotel and later went on to have an enjoyable meal in the Old Punch Bowl. Upon our return to the hotel we had our first team meeting of the tournament we received our new gear thanks to the school and Fiona and Ed Barry.

We had a 7:30am start on the Thursday. We all changed into our gear for our first game at 9:30 against the hosting team who were the favourites of the tournament. The hotel had prepared a large breakfast buffet for all teams which we all happily dug into. We loaded onto the bus and began our speedy drive to the pitch. Nerves were high but we were confident with the hard work and dedication the whole team and coaches had invested all year.

After our warmup, we got match ready, had our team huddle and the match began. In the first minute of the game Leah Clery had a chance on goal but was taken out by Jes goalie which resulted in a stroke for Leah. She kept her cool, and her eye on the target, scoring a lovely push to the bottom left corner of the goal, giving us the 1-0 lead we needed to settle into the game. We had many more shots on goal and finally successfully scored a goal taken by Sophie Clein giving us our 2-0 lead.



The next was set up by Aoife Hickey in the 22nd minute, Aoife intercepted the ball in the middle of the pitch finding a direct pass to Nicole Griffin who made a brilliant run into the circle. Nicole was the able to find a pass back to Aoife who was just to the right of the penalty spot which led to Aoife scoring a goal with ease. One minute into the second half, Leah Clery finds her second goal of the game giving us a 4-0 lead. Leah Clery again, sends a quick ball back-post to Clare O'Meara who went on to score a reverse flick into the goal after the Jes goalie slips and takes out one of her own players in the process making it 5-0. So Hockey Senior Cup Final

On the 27th of February 2019, the Munster Senior Cup hockey final took place in Garyduff, Cork. On this day, Crescent took on their biggest rival Mount Mercy in what was bound to be an incredible test. The two teams have been each other's biggest competition since they met in last year's Senior Cup final, which resulted in a replay. In the replay Crescent lost out narrowly and have been training hard ever since to win back the cup for the first time since 2016.

The only other time the two teams met this year, was back in November for a league match. Crescent

lost this match 3-2, making them the outright underdog for the final. This gave the Crescent side more determination than ever. The team worked harder than ever before to reach the standard of a winning Senior Cup team before the final, including a trip to Kilkenny and Dublin for a three-match series over midterm.

In the first five minutes of the final, Mount Mercy snuck an early goal putting the Crescent girls to the ultimate test. The Crescent side showed no sign of fear and kept their calm. At half time Mount Mercy were still winning 1-0. Encouraging team talks from their coaches Cathal Duggan and Gary Kirby at half-time helped the girls re-focus on the prize for the second half. Early in the second half, Crescent showed their character more than ever when they settled the score with a crucial goal from Leah Clery. The full-time score was 1-1 after an incredibly tense and exciting match.

As a result of the full-time score, five girls from each team would take on their rival goalie in a 1 V 1 shuttle. Anna Horan, Sarah Barry, Aoife Hickey, Leah Clery and Elle Sorenson showed their brave characters when they stepped up to take a shuttle. Mount Mercy scored one from five shuttles on Crescent's Goalie and captain Amy Ahern, while Crescent scored two from five shuttles with super goals from Leah Clery and Elle Sorenson. This resulted in Crescent being crowned Senior Cup champions 2019 and booked them a place at the Kate Russell All-Ireland tournament in St. Andrews of Dublin on the 20th and 21st of March.




No Mossies In March

For the month of March in Crescent there is a campaign to buy mosquito nets for the children in a Jesuit school in Uganda.

A teacher in our school, Antoinette Ryan started this campaign after her visit to Ocer Campion Jesuit College in Uganda during the October midterm last year.

The campaign began when students and



teachers began to notice images of mosquitoes which were displayed around the school. The students were curious when they saw these images and wanted to find out more.

The reason for the mosquito pictures was revealed when Ms. Ryan spoke at the Ash Wednesday Mass last week. Ms. Ryan told us about her trip and how she met a girl called Mary and many other children like her, whose parents cannot afford to buy mosquito nets to protect their children while they sleep. Mary is shown in the picture below.

Over 50% of the children in Mary's school are sick with malaria and a lot cannot afford medicine. Malaria is a disease which is carried by mosquitoes and is transmitted through their bite. Malaria is the leading cause of death in Uganda.

Crescent students have been asked to get involved by buying mosquito nets costing €5. There was a model of a bed constructed with a mosquito net in the

to give us a visual representation of what we would buying.

It is hoped that everyone will get behind this campaign and support this cause.

The Fairtrade mark is the most widely-recognised ethical label globally. Lots of companies have gone Fairtrade over the past few years.


Many students who don't know much about makeup found it very useful and now can practice a new skill.
